The Transition Program recognizes that students are most effective as employees and citizens when they feel independent, productive and confident. We provide opportunities for the students to achieve these goals through vocational training, daily living skills practice, personal-social skill practice and planning for all aspects of their life.

Education/Training

Transition Program Classes:

Students are divided into instructional groups and participate in 4 classes daily, as well as receiving instruction in their homeroom.

- Daily Living Skills
- Vocational Skills
- Functional Academics
- Personal Social Skills

Students also participate in a weekly elective and fitness classes at the community center.

Curriculum:

We are currently in the process of redesigning and aligning our curriculum across the program. The current design focuses on Project Based Learning and The Council for Exceptional Children's *Life Center Education* curriculum. One goal of the new design is to incorporate more curriculum resources from *Understanding by Design*. Within individual Pods and classrooms a number of research based curriculum resources and interventions are utilized to support the needs of the students.

Community College:

SWCCCASE Transition Program provides the following supports for students attending local community colleges:

- •Transportation between our program and the college campus
- •Resource support for executive skills provided 3 days a week for 1 hour
- •College Campus elective introduces students to the campus and important places around campus (i.e. financial aid office, tutoring centers)

Employment

Vocational Training Experiences:

Students participate in job training with support from a para/job coach. Student progress is closely monitored through case notes, skill checklists, and assessment rubrics.

DRS Partnership:

SWCCCASE has a partner relationship with DRS. Transition program administrators supervise the DRS staff, which consists of two program coordinators and two program secretaries. DRS staff oversee approximately 260 active DRS clients (with up to 140 in the referral process at this time) at the member high schools, the SWCCCASE Transition program, local high school transition programs, and private placements.

Vocational Coordinators:

SWCCCASE Transition Program currently employs two vocational coordinators. Their responsibilities include:

- Job and training site development
- Coordination of student training assignments
- •Coordination of transportation for college, training sites, and competitive employees.
- Preparation for competitive/community employment
- Coordination of participation in job fairs and interviews.
- Community employment support

Assessment

In addition to triennial reevaluations, student progress is evaluated through the following assessments:

- Curriculum Based Assessments
- Brigance Transition Skills Inventory
- Brigance Inventory of Early Development III
- •Program developed Job Skills Rubric that mirrors the DRS vocational training site evaluation.
